



These are people who have the gall to believe they can fix us—us and our deficit, our fossil fuels, our racism, poverty, our potholes and public schools. The egomania required to be president or a presidential assassin makes the two types brothers of sorts. Presidents and presidential assassins are like Las Vegas and Salt Lake City that way. Even though one city is all about sin and the other is all about salvation, they are identical, one-dimensional company towns built up out of the desert by the sheer will of true believers. Meet The Assassins



John Wilkes Booth May 10, 1838 - April 26, 1865 Assassinated Abraham Lincoln

John Wilkes Booth was a successful stage actor. A fervent supporter of the Confederacy and vehemently opposed to the abolition of slavery, Booth assassinated President Abraham Lincoln during a performance at Ford's Theater. Booth believed that killing Lincoln would avenge the South's defeat in the Civil War and possibly inspire a resurgence of the Confederate cause. He was shot and killed by Sergeant Thomas H. "Boston" Corbett while trying to hide on a Virginia farm.



Charles J. Guiteau
September 8, 1841 - June 30, 1882
Assassinated James Garfield

Charles Guiteau was a failed lawyer, writer, and theologian. Guiteau believed he was owed a diplomatic post for his minor role in Garfield's campaign. When his requests were denied, he became delusional, convinced that killing Garfield would unite the Republican Party and save the nation. He was convicted and executed for the crime.



Leon F. Czolgosz May 5, 1873 – October 29, 1901 Assassinated William McKinley

Leon Czolgosz was a Polish-American laborer. Influenced by radical anarchist beliefs, Czolgosz saw President McKinley as a symbol of oppression and corporate power. He believed that killing the president would ignite a revolution against the government and societal inequalities. Czolgosz was arrested immediately after the assassination and was later executed in the electric chair.



Giuseppe Zangara

September 7, 1900 - March 20, 1933

Attempted To Assassinate Franklin Delano Roosevelt

Giuseppe Zangara was an Italian immigrant and laborer. Suffering from chronic pain and deeply resentful of government figures, whom he blamed for his hardships, Zangara fired at Roosevelt during a public event in Miami. He missed Roosevelt, but fatally wounded Chicago Mayor Anton Cermak. Zangara was swiftly convicted and executed.



Lee Harvey Oswald

October 18, 1939 – November 24, 1963 Assassinated John F. Kennedy

Lee Harvey Oswald was a former U.S. Marine. A Marxist with a history of defecting to the Soviet Union, Oswald was deeply disillusioned with American society. His motives remain unclear, but his actions were likely fueled by his radical political beliefs and personal frustrations. Oswald was killed after his assassination of John F. Kennedy two days later by nightclub owner Jack Ruby.



Samuel Byck

January 30, 1930 – February 22, 1974 Attempted To Assassinate Richard Nixon

Samuel Byck was a former tire salesman. Struggling with mental health issues and feeling marginalized by society, Byck blamed Nixon and the government for his personal failures. He planned to hijack a plane and crash it into the White House. Byck's plot was thwarted when he was shot and killed by police during the attempt.



Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme

October 22, 1948 -


Attempted To Assassinate Gerald Ford

Lynette Fromme was a member of the Manson Family, a cult led by Charles Manson. She attempted to assassinate President Gerald Ford as a protest against environmental issues and in support of Manson. Fromme was apprehended before she could fire. She was sentenced to life in prison but was released on parole in 2009.



Sara Jane Moore February 15, 1930 -Attempted To Assassinate Gerald Ford

Sara Jane Moore was an accountant and political activist. Moore was married five times and had four children before abandoning domestic life to join the counter-culture movement. Disillusioned by political and social turmoil, she believed killing Ford would incite a revolution. Her shot narrowly missed, and she was quickly subdued. Moore was sentenced to life in prison but was released on parole in 2007.



John Hinckley Jr.
May 29, 1955 Attempted To Assassinate Ronald Reagan

John Hinckley Jr. was a student and musician. Motivated by an obsession with actress Jodie Foster and a desire to gain her attention, Hinckley believed that killing Reagan would impress her. He shot Reagan and three others outside a Washington, D.C., hotel. Hinckley was found not guilty by reason of insanity and was later released in 2016.

John Weidman (Book) has written the books for a wide variety of musicals, among them Pacific Overtures (Tony nomination, Best Book), Assassins (Tony Award, Best Musical Revival), and Road Show (Lucille Lortel nomination, Best Musical), all with scores by Stephen Sondheim; Contact (Tony nomination, Best Book; Tony Award, Best Musical), cocreated with director/choreographer Susan Stroman; Happiness, score by Scott Frankel and Michael Korie, directed and choreographed by Susan Stroman; Take Flight and Big (Tony nomination, Best Book), scores by Richard Maltby Jr. and David Shire; and the new book, co-authored with Timothy Crouse, for the Lincoln Center Theater/Roundabout Theatre revivals of Cole Porter's Anything Goes (Tony Awards, Best Musical Revival; Olivier Award, Best Musical Production). Since his children were pre-schoolers, Weidman has written for Sesame Street, receiving more than a dozen Emmy Awards for Outstanding Writing for a Children's Program. From 1999 to 2009 he served as President of the Dramatists Guild of America.

Stephen Sondheim (Music and Lyrics), 1930-2021, wrote the music and lyrics for Saturday Night (1954), A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum (1962), Anyone Can Whistle (1964), Company (1970), Follies (1971), A Little Night Music (1973), The Frogs (1974), Pacific Overtures (1976), Sweeney Todd (1979), Merrily We Roll Along (1981), Sunday In The Park With George (1984), Into The Woods (1987), Assassins (1991), Passion (1994), Road Show (2008) and HERE WE ARE (2023), as well as the lyrics for West Side Story (1957), Gypsy (1959), Do I Hear A Waltz? (1965) and additional lyrics for Candide (1973). Side By Side By Sondheim (1976), Marry Me A Little (1981), You're Gonna Love Tomorrow (1983), Putting It Together (1993/99), Moving On (2001), Sondheim On Sondheim (2010) and Old Friends (2023) are anthologies of his work as composer and lyricist. For films, he composed the scores of "Stavisky" (1974), co-composed the score for "Reds" (1981), and wrote songs for "Dick Tracy" (1990). He wrote songs for the television production "Evening Primrose" (1966), co-authored the film "The Last of Sheila" (1973) and the play Getting Away With Murder (1996) and provided incidental music for the plays The Girls of Summer (1956), Invitation To A March (1961), Twigs (1971) and The Enclave (1973). He won the Tony Award for Best Score for Company, Follies, A Little Night Music, Sweeney Todd, Into the Woods, and Passion, all of which won the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award, as did Pacific Overtures and Sunday In The Park With George, the latter also receiving the Pulitzer Prize for Drama (1985). Stephen Sondheim was born and raised in New York City. He graduated from Williams College, winning the Hutchinson Prize for Music Composition, after which he studied theory and composition with Milton Babbitt. He served on the Council of the Dramatists Guild, the national association of playwrights, composers and lyricists, and served as its president from 1973 to 1981. In 1983 he was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters and in 1990 was appointed the first Visiting Professor of Contemporary Theatre at Oxford University. He was awarded the Kennedy Center Honors in 1993, the National Medal of Arts in 1996, the MacDowell Medal in 2013 and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015. His collected lyrics with attendant essays have been published in two volumes: "Finishing the Hat" (2010) and "Look, I Made a Hat" (2011). In 2010 the Broadway theater formerly known as Henry Miller's Theatre was renamed in his honor, and in 2019 he became the first living artist to have a theatre named in his honor on Shaftesbury Avenue when the refurbished Queen's Theatre in London's West End was renamed the Sondheim Theatre to commemorate his 90th birthday, by Sir Cameron Mackintosh.


